PFAS STATE SNAPSHOT: DELAWARE PFAS REGULATION

Delaware is one of several states that has started regulating per- and polyfluoroalkyl substances ("PFAS") in drinking water and groundwater. This client alert reflects the status of PFAS regulations in Delaware as of February 21, 2020.



DRINKING WATER

Delaware has adopted EPA's Health Advisory level of 70 ppt of PFOA and PFOS, either individually or combined, for drinking water. Certain drinking water systems have tested for these two components depending on the relative locations to existing PFAS contamination.

GROUNDWATER

Delaware has adopted EPA's Health Advisory level of 70 ppt of PFOA and PFOS, either individually or combined, for groundwater. Importantly, PFAS are regulated in Delaware under the Hazardous Substance Cleanup Act, which addresses sampling for the chemicals in groundwater and surface water.
